# FICTION - RECOMMEND

Anderson, Robert L. 9780062338679 \$17.99 332 p. **Dreamland** Harper Teen, 2015

Teenage O'Dea Donohue has a unique gift (or curse) bestowed upon her by her mother in which she must "walk" other people's dreams or become ill. She has been walking dreams since she was six, which sets her apart from other kids, as well as the fact that she and her mother keep moving at a moment's notice. Dea's mother will not reveal the reason for their frequent moves. Dea also stumbles upon the fact that her mother has been lying about the identity of Dea's father. Dea grows angry and distrustful of her mother. Understandably, Dea doesn't make many friends and tends to be bullied at school. She strikes up a tentative friendship with an attractive neighbor boy, Connor, who also has a mysterious past. Dea's mother has taught her that while walking dreams there are specific rules that must be followed: never interfere, never be seen, and never walk the same person's dream more than once. However, once Dea begins walking Connor's dreams, she starts breaking those rules. The result is that is then pursued by faceless monsters, which is exactly what her mother warned her about. When her mother suddenly disappears, Dea runs away and is compelled to explore Connor's frightening nightmares to solve the mystery of his violent past as well as to confront significant truths about her own past. A suspenseful, imaginative, action-packed read. Had just enough complexity in plot and character development to be interesting without getting bogged down. I especially enjoyed some of the creepier moments involving the faceless monsters. Will appeal to fans of Maggie Stiefvater's the Raven Cycle. Great effort by this new author. Recommended. Grades 8 Up.

In this post-apocalyptic fantasy, 16-year-old Hallie and her 26-year-old sister Marthe are struggling to keep their Roadstead Farm going. Hallie tries to be civil to Marthe but their closeness has vanished since their father's death and Marthe's pregnancy. Six months ago Marthe's husband joined the army down south to fight a dark God. Weeks ago, the Wicked God was defeated, but not all men have returned home. In a moment of desperation, Hallie hires on a wandering veteran, Heron. Soon, strange things occur around their farm. Hallie sees ghostly images and mysterious messages are written out with river rocks. Hallie figures out that Heron is hiding dark dangerous secrets that could cause them to lose more than their farm. Then, Twisted Things appear--black feathered bird creatures that burn anything they touch, especially human flesh. These Twisted Things were the playthings of the South's Wicked God. With these sightings, word has reached the army and they threaten to not only quarantine them but burn down the whole farm. Add in some romance with Hallie's childhood friend, Thom, who did return from the war deeply scarred, physically and emotionally, and it might be enough to keep teens reading. Supposedly there

were deep dark family secrets, but I never noticed them. It was interesting reading about this broken world, but I'd prefer a more complete back story as much of it remains a mystery.

Trail of the Dead is set in a creative post-apocalyptic dystopia. Before the start of the first book, a 'cloud' descended that destroyed all electricity, and transformed the world. Genetically modified animals have escaped their electrified cages and now roam free and feed on, well, people. The rulers, modified with genetics, chemicals, and surgery, send our teenage hero out of their fenced compound to hunt these monsters. Lozen has inherited an ability to hunt matched only in Native mythology. In the first book, Lozen fought monsters to save herself and her family. In the second book, her plans grow beyond family. As she leads a group through the Southwest, she has to now kill evil people in order to survive. As they follow her route, the group encounters another tribe who become their allies. Throughout, native myths and values are seamlessly interwoven. The book is always violent, beginning with battles against mutated monsters, progressing to evil humans. Along the way our main character becomes stronger, more responsible for others, and grows in her understanding of her heritage. Non-stop action, battles, and gore should satisfy most young readers. The native mythology is a great addition to the library, despite the cover art.

becomes increasingly darker, the body count starts and soon Kaylee is trying to find out who's really behind Need before her own request kills her. Teens will love this fast-paced thrill ride, especially with the social networking component. Twelve-year-old Xander hates school because it is a) boring to his busy brain, b) his teacher seems to hate him, and c) he gets made fun of both for being half-Japanese and that his mother left his family. The only bright spots are his terrific abilities in computer class, his excellent drawing skills, and best friend

Peyton. After an exceptionally weird day at school, Xander's father offers him a previously unseen graphic novel about the Japanese demon-fighter Momotaro. Xander promptly tosses this aside in his room, but Peyton picks it up, reading aloud the story of Momotaro and his traveling companions the dog, the pheasant, and the monkey. They notice that Xander himself is listed as the author/illustrator of the story but before the boys can wonder about that, they are called down to dinner by Xander's strict grandmother. Dinner is interrupted by a sudden tsunami, during which his father goes outside and disappears. Grandmother reveals that the men in this family are Momotaro, that the stories are all true, and Xander's father, who was trying to use a more intellectual approach to controlling demons, has just been taken captive. Xander must take up his duties as the next Momotaro, fight the demons, and rescue his father. But Xander isn't particularly physically strong and even Grandmother isn't sure what effect being only half-Japanese will have on his abilities, though she assures him his talents will appear in time. Full of doubts and armed only with wooden figurines, Xander takes his family dog and Peyton aboard a magical boat to the island of the demons. A solid middle grade action-adventure novel with illustrations that opens up possibilities for sequels. While the pace is slower and the humor is gentler than Rick Riordan's series, readers will be rewarded with this new magical world with Japanese details. There is also a depth here as Xander wrestles with his biracial identity and struggles to find his talents (though the book spends a bit too much time in whiny selfdoubt). Many questions remain unanswered at the end, so it seems to be the first in a series.

I recommend this book for 5th grade and up. On the eve of being made a knight Tiuri answers a call for distress and he is catapulted into an epic adventure. He faces challenges with deceptive enemies, mother nature, and most of all questioning himself and his motivation for completing his mission which is to deliver a letter to King Unawen who lives far away from

Tiuri's home. There are two things that stand out to me in this delightfully told medieval story. First, the writing style is no nonsense, almost Hemingway like. Not a syllable is wasted. Second, the tension of wondering what is in the letter is pretty intense. I actually found myself saying aloud in my car, at work, or at home "WHAT IS IN THAT DARN LETTER!!!" The message of the story is very positive, and I found the characters, plot, and style to be a refreshing change compared to the trends in YA today. Maybe that is because this story was published in the 60's but only translated to English in 2003. So I guess you could say it gets back to basics with those things you can recall from childhood that make a great story. The author's life is also very fascinating. There is nothing that I can think of in this story that would be objectionable content, and because of the straight forward writing style I think that younger kids, maybe 5th grade even, might get into it. It is a lot of pages, though, so maybe that would be a turn off to a non-reader. But for middle school and up I think readers who lean towards fantasy categories will really love it. I highly recommend this book for any library!

Willem Verheyen, a teen whose father was a leading soldier in Napoleon's dinosaur army, lives in a French village with his mother, avoiding detection and the smaller European dinosaurs until Napoleon passes through to Waterloo. This time, Napoleon wins, and it is partly due to Willem's actions, although Willem must reveal his presence to the emperor.

I really enjoyed this well-researched novel (sources are given in the back). The characters of the village are believable and the small-town feeling gives way to large-scale historical events that seem beyond everyone's control. Despite the premise, the dinosaurs don't appear that often, but when they do, they move the plot forward well. I would give this to 5th-8th graders. It's a fairly dense book, and the dinosaurs may seem scarce, but the battle scenes and village drama make up for it. A sequel is in the works.

Along the way, Kaidu meets a local girl named Rat. Sassy and confident in one breath and lost and angry in the next, Rat eventually overcomes her antagonism towards Kaidu, and they become friends. The majority of the book deals with setting and character development, although there is an attempted coup as well as seeds of double agents and misdirection. The book touches on issues of complex friendships, racism, classism, and sexism but in a firmly middle grade tone. The city and ruling party are heavily inspired by feudal China while the citizens are multicultural in a such a way that it's like looking at a street in Rio. 5th-7th graders will love it, especially if they are looking for character-driven novels.

the road – she can sell merch. If adjusting to life on a tour bus wasn't enough, Chelsea also starts a fling with TV pretty boy Lucas who decides he also wants to try life on the road. He drives the band nuts, and ends up increasing the wedge between them and Chelsea. Chelsea has to figure out what she really wants...fame or real music...and if she doesn't work it out soon she may just end back as no one in her hometown. A fun beach read that behind all the drama includes some realistic components on what life on tour is like for musicians. Not a must have, but fans of music and romance will certainly enjoy it. Recommend. Grades 8+.

"I am fearless. I am friendless. I am Fox." Isla, a young foxling, is on her own after her brother Pirie and the rest of her family are marked as Traitors and have disappeared. Their home is also gone and Isla must escape Karka, the vixen with the single gray eye. The escape path is through "The Great Snarl', where the two-legged 'furless' live. The 'manglers' are prowling the stone paths, called 'deathways'. Isla must find her family, but first she must find food. Isla is just a young fox, and she has much to learn about Foxcraft and The Elders. An older fox, Siffrin is talented in Foxcraft and is also looking for Isla's brother, Pirie. Together they gain an understanding, as Isla grows toward adulthood and Siffrin shares his knowledge of Foxlore.

Similar to the Warrior's series, Foxcraft is written by Inbali Iserles, an English writer who is one of the authors comprising the pseudonym Erin Hunter. Each chapter begins with a black and white illustration, there is a map of The Lands of Foxcraft and the story is followed by a Foxcraft Glossary. "Book One: The Taken" starts off a bit slowly as Isla's character doesn't appear quickly, the reader doesn't know any more than Isla about Foxcraft, and the action is not very fast-paced. It does pick up about one third of the way in and the book will be enjoyed by fans of animal fantasies. Its open ending will lead middle schoolers to the next book in the series. Recommended for Grades 4 – 7.

Alice and Celia are inseparable. They're twins, they both survived being alone in a house for several days as children after their grandfather died, and they've been through the foster care system together. They're inseparable, but they are also vastly different. Celia (or Cellie, as Alice calls her) has a dark side. A violent side. A fire-starting side. After escaping from Savage Isle Mental Hospital, Alice and her boyfriend Jason think they are free from Cellie's darkness. But then she finds them, and wherever there is Cellie, there is fire. Following Alice in the tragic aftermath of this incident, Emiko Jean's novel slowly reveals the events leading up to the fateful fire by detailing her experiences back at Savage Isle after the failed escape attempt, and revealing snippets of the journal in which Alice writes the history of her and Cellie's lives in foster care. On the surface, this novel seems to be a well-crafted and gritty exploration of grief, mental illness, and unhealthy relationships, but

Emiko Jean has actually created a very effective suspense thriller. The bouncing back and forth between traditional narration and journal entries is a clever way of keeping the reader turning pages, and the surprising ending is satisfying in more ways than one.

Based on her own experiences as a teenage bulimarexic in 1988 (diagnosed with both bulimia and anorexia), Jennifer Johnson has asked to be hospitalized. Her experience in the in-patient facility, is however, drastically different than she had imagined (beautiful white room, fresh flowers, sweet nurses). Instead she finds herself trapped in an ugly institutional environment with predictably disgusting food, and a head nurse straight out of the pages of One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest. The style of the book at the beginning is reminiscent of Ellen Hopkins blank verse style. The font is larger and mimics handwriting and is told in 3rd person point of view. As the story progresses and Jennifer settles in, the writing style remains in blank verse and 3rd person but the font changes to a more normal typeset. As Jennifer makes progress towards recovery, she begins to find her voice and the writing style changes to 1st person. Although "Nurse Ratched" is cruel and obviously dysfunctional, Jennifer finds a champion and friend in the night nurse, Chuck, upon whom she comes to rely. Jennifer's therapist is also skilled and caring. Jennifer's family is forced into therapy sessions and the unhealthy dynamics of her family are painfully illuminated. It was very interesting to read about life in an addiction recovery facility. I personally enjoyed the references to TV shows, music and 80s culture. Additionally, the character of Jennifer is very likeable and I began rooting for her recovery very early on. There were, however, two areas of the book that left me with unanswered questions: one, Jennifer reported that she began to have issues with food as a result of feeling stressed out in 2nd grade but the root cause of this anxiety was not explored in depth; and, two, her brother, who was largely silent throughout the family therapy sessions, obviously had his own set of issues and these were also left largely unexplored. Fans of Ellen Hopkins will definitely enjoy this book. I recommend this book for grades 8 and up.

Ezra and Kady have just broken up, but Kady sees him again a bit sooner than she was expecting when she's forced to rescue him during a sudden attack on their planet Kerenza. For reasons that no one knows, a Beitech company ship is laying waste to the illegal mining colony where they live. Escaping with 3,000 survivors spread out on three ships, the Alexander, the Hypatia, and the Copernicus, Kady and Ezra begin to rekindle their relationship while they try to make sense of the tragedy. Kady uses her computer skills to hack network systems and reveal information, while Ezra is drafted into the military and trained as a fighter pilot. Everyone is needed if the ships are going to escape from the Beitech ship that is still in pursuit of them all. But when the AI computer system on the Alexander goes rogue in response to a virus outbreak on the Copernicus, the survivors only

have more threats to contain. Formatted in a collection of documents and chat histories, Illuminae is creatively put together. All profanity is blacked out, as if it were classified, but because nothing else is blacked out it is easy to determine which curse word is intended. This makes the black out more annoying than protective. The formula of space chase + rogue AI + virus outbreak + romance was interesting, but the unique format of the story doesn't carry the action as well as it could have. I would recommend it to fans of sci-fi or dystopia. Grades 7+.

While the depressed moms are upstairs talking, the kids are downstairs working with an art therapist who doesn't know how to deal with the group. Thorn, a boy in search of his father, is purchased as a slave by Tyburn, House Shadow's executioner. When Thorn arrives back at Castle Gloom in Gehenna, home of the Shadows, ancestors of necromancers and evil sorcerers, his only thoughts are of escape and finding his dad. Lily, now reluctantly Lady Shadow after her entire family was murdered by a group of bandits, has her upcoming peace treaty of a marriage to arrogant Gabriel, prince of Shadow's arch enemy, House Solar, on her mind. When someone, probably Gabriel, tries to poison Lily, she looks to her people's history of magic for help -- even though it's taboo for girls. Not being one to follow gender stereotypes or authority, Lily enlists the help of some unlikely new friends, Thorn, K'leef (Solar's prisoner from House Sultanate) & a giant bat to figure out who is trying to kill her, the last of the Shadow line. Although Rick Riordan states in his endorsement of this book, "If you are pining for that thrill you felt when you first discovered Harry Potter, let me recommend Shadow Magic" I wouldn't go quite that far. I do agree with this, though: "Here is a fantasy world you will want to lose yourself in--with Six Great Families of magic, the nicest princess of darkness you've ever met, a peasant boy with skills to rival Robin Hood, and a supporting cast of zombies, paladins, ghost puppies, executioners, minstrels, murderers, and a giant hero bat." It's interesting that Disney is the publisher because the entire time I read, I pictured a Disney animated film.

But Oliver isn't quite the same, and the citizens of 1818 Geneva believe that those with clockwork parts are an affront to God. Hiding in an abandoned mansion, Oliver curses his brother for what he has done. And then their friend Mary mails Alasdair a copy of the new book Frankenstein, which has a shockingly familiar storyline. Alasdair's life falls further into upheaval when his father is arrested for helping people with clockwork limbs. Already there to help, an assistant of Dr. Geisler's helps Alasdair escape the city and brings him to Dr. Geisler's laboratory. Turns out Dr. Geisler has read Frankenstein too, and sees it as proof that Alasdair has accomplished what he could not. All Alasdair has to do is hand over his brother to Dr. Geisler. This Monstrous Thing is an excellent reimagining of Frankenstein that also weaves in the life of its author. Perfect for fans of steampunk or historical fiction, the writing style is both descriptive and swift. Recommended for Grades 7+.

Mostly mute and docile, even under the abuse of asylum staff, Grace eventually cracks and attacks the asylum's head doctor. As punishment, Grace is subjected to a unique form of torture that causes her to lose the baby. Thrown into the asylum's basement dungeon to wait for her father to claim her, Grace meets Dr. Thornhollow, a surgeon who performs lobotomies. She begs him to remove her ability to think and feel, but Dr. Thornhollow notices her skill in observing numerous details and refuses to mar her intelligence. Instead, they devise a ruse that allows Grace to escape with Dr. Thornhollow to his new job as the head of an asylum in Ohio. With Grace by his side, they practice the emerging science of criminal psychology. But just when Grace begins to feel safe, she realizes that the problem of her father has not been solved yet. Grace's little sister is still at home and growing up fast. This dark historical thriller treats readers to an immersive setting, memorable characters, and haunting scenes. While the end was just slightly rushed, the pacing and story are very well done. Grades 9+

When Celia Cross's aunt dies she must return to her childhood home, Sanctuary, and face the deaths of her sister and grandmother and the incarceration of her mother as well as a legend of an evil captain who forced one of her own ancestors into an abusive, deadly marriage.

Set in the late 1930s, Celia is an independent 17-yr old who is haunted by the ghost Amoret, the wife of Captain Winship, a ruthless British captain who forced the French Acadians from their homes in Nova Scotia during the later part of the 18th century. Celia's mother was committed to a mental hospital five years prior after the death of Celia's grandmother and sister in an unexplained house fire. Now, Celia is trying to find out the truth behind the ghost that haunts her before she, too, is claimed by the family's curse.

Her only solace is the mansion's huge library, filled with historical tomes. Yet, her uncle, a bitter, violent man has decided to sell these books to a young professor, Eli Bauer, and although Celia initially detests him for wanting to take her books, soon they form a friendship that promises to become something more.

Nothing, is however, as it seems, and soon Celia begins have visions that share with her another story from long ago about a captive wife, a love affair and ghostly possessions. When the truth comes out, Celia must act quickly to save her mother and herself from the evil that remains at Sanctuary.

I thought it was an intriguing ghost/murder mystery and one that a particular reader would enjoy. The setting is lush and well described, and, the historical features feel authentic. Celia, however, strikes me as a bit too 21st century in her behaviors, however, given that her own history has been strange and rather isolated, that could be a rationale. I thought the story was well plotted and contained enough twists and turns to make it unpredictable along the way.

Black comedy explores the nature of boy band fandom. The Ruperts were put together as a boy band because they all had the first name Rupert and all competed on a British talent TV show. They've outshined every boy band to date in part because each of the four boys appeals to a different kind of girl. The narrator found comfort after her father's death in their music and identifying with down-to-earth Rupert K. Her popular and persuasive best friend Erin loves the pretty boy rebel Rupert X. Isabel, who runs a Rupert fan sighting website, stalks the entrepreneuring Rupert L. And the wealthy and obese Apple desperately adores Rupert P., who is considered the ugliest and least talented of the band (all he does is juggle). The four 15 year olds, friends through their fan activities, plan to stay at the same hotel as the band when they come to New York for a special live Thanksgiving concert. They dream of catching a glimpse of the boys but end up in a nightmare when Apple spies Rupert P. at the ice machine. Overcome by her love for him, the large girl tackles him, knocking the boy out cold, and drags him back to their hotel room. They certainly didn't mean to kidnap him, but now that they have him, Erin wants the girls to tie him up and use the situation to their advantage. But our narrator has doubts and when things spin out of control, resulting in a death, she has to question everything she thinks she knows about her friends and what it means to love a boy band. The author deftly exposes the ins and outs of boy band culture while channeling the best humor of 1980's teen comedies. This stand

alone novel is recommended for older readers based on language, off-screen sex, and dark situations.

Ray is a survivor of foster care and abuse who runs away to start over in New York City. Pinny, whose down's syndrome does not prevent her from having a more realistic view of human nature than most people, is a survivor in her own way. If all three girls have seem to have more than their share of sorrow and luck and the coincidence of the shoes is incredible, Serendipity's Footsteps is still compelling reading. The author's insights into the struggles of all three girls—grief, loneliness, rage, bewilderment, trust—are thought provoking. The author's notes at the end of the book provide information about the historical background and other topics touched on in the book.

A pair of handmade pink shoes holds this story together. It begins in 1938 on Kristallnacht in Berlin Germany. Fifteen year old Dayla has just finished making her perfect pair of shoes which she plans to wear one day at her wedding. Her family is preparing to flee NAZI persecution and Dayla hides her shoes in the floorboards of her father's cobbler shop. The NAZI's come and the family ends up in a concentration camp where her parents both die. Dayla is able to escape with the help of a family friend Aaron. She ends up with a wealthy family in New York. When the son in this family, Henry, pays attention, Dayla is quickly excused, but is again reunited with and marries Aaron.

The shoes are discovered by an American in the rubble of Berlin and taken home to be given to a fiancé. The chapters of this book alternate between many characters and different times in history. A second story unfolds with two orphans Pinny and Ray in a children's home in Texas, 2013. Ray wants to run away to New York to go to Juliard, and Pinny, who has mild Donwn's Syndrome, will follow her. Ray discovers that the heal of a pair of pink shoes she stole from a secondhand store has rings inside and decides this is what will get her to New York.

The stories intersect when the senior Dayla meets up with the pair of runaways in New York and the secret of the shoes unfolds where the shoes and rings returned to the original owner and the runaways find a place to begin a new life. This is a book that will be enjoyed by high school students.

Sometimes the "good guys" are very difficult to distinguish from the "bad guys", and maybe those lines aren't that clear at all. Although it could actually stand alone, it's a great follow-up to book 1. Although advertised as a duology and a third is not currently planned, there's room for another story here. Gerta's father and brother take a trip to West Berlin to make arrangements for their move, and that's when it happens. In the night, a fence goes up, and her father and brother are trapped on the other side. Time passes – five years later, Gerta is now 12, and her family is still divided in two. The fence is now a wall, and there are guards in turrets making sure no-one from the east ever escapes into the west. One day, while walking past the wall, Gerta sees something she at first believes she's imagining. Her father. And he's motioning for her to dig. Gerta arms herself with a shovel and decides to follow her father's instructions. She and her brother are going to dig their way to freedom. This novel is Nielsen's first foray into historical fiction after her acclaimed The False Prince fantasy novel, and she creates a harrowing suspense story set in a fascinating time period. Ideal for upper elementary and middle schoolers, students might need a little bit of background on the Cold War and the division of Germany after World War II, but the compelling story will be enough for kids to crave more historical context. Just like Gerta and Fritz's tunnel races from east to west, readers will race to the end of this book to find out what happens.

In this teen romance there are no real surprises, just some plot twists and turns that keep the reader interested. Jake and Elena are sympathetic characters, we definitely root for them, and are not disappointed. Part of Wicked Games series all set in the beach town of Dream Point, I'm looking forward to checking out the rest. Recommended for 8th grade and up.

Experiencing all this pressure causes Gabi to rethink her life--maybe getting all As isn't as important as literally surviving your senior year of high school. Teens looking for a realistic suspenseful story that also includes a new romance and family drama will love this one. Every few chapters features a poem written by the bomber as part of his/her "Stranger Manifesto" that reveal inner motivations and clues to the person's identity.

Intrigue at boarding school for future CIA operatives. Fleeing a bad break up and social stumble, sixteen-year-old Nadia gladly accepts a sudden invite to an all-expenses-paid boarding school in Arizona. Upon arrival, she's even happier to find out the school is actually a secret training ground for CIA Black Ops. After all, she is smart and competitive, having won national championships for cryptology and learned how to read people from her criminology professor father. But this is October and the other students have been studying together since summer. Fitting into the team is awkward, especially when it turns out the spot opened up because a student was murdered. Determined to do her best, she forms bonds with her teammates; OCD Southern belle Libby, intellectually brilliant yet socially awkward Alan, and the charming and hyper-observant Damon. Unknown to her, each is hiding potentially explosive secrets. Committed to increasing her physical abilities, Nadia asks for and receives extra training with the combat instructor, Hashimoto Sensei, which results in a mentorship relationship. Nadia is cautiously optimistic when Jack, the handsome senior team leader, shows interest in her. Her trust in others is hampered when she hears rumors of a student double agent, but it is shattered when she realizes someone is planting evidence to frame her as the double. This is a well-plotted mystery adventure novel that ironically reminds me a bit of Harry Potter (We find out Nadia is suspect and unique because she got all the prescreening questions correct, Hashimoto Sensei functions like Dumbledore, and it is at a boarding school). Third-person narration alternate viewpoints between Nadia and each of her teammates, Jack, and the unidentified double agent. By the end, the stage is set for a series.

Their trip will take a frightening turn when the Captain decides to pursue the legendary Great Terrafin that destroyed his previous ship.

If this all sounds familiar, it should. Yes, this is Moby Dick in space! It's a future world where the earth has been virtually destroyed, the ultra-wealthy "Gilded" live a very different life from everyone else, and time travel exists. Strasser's storytelling is quick and exciting, his characters believable and even though the basic story is well-known, it sounds

new. The big climax isn't really a surprise, but it doesn't matter. This is a great addition to the sci-fi/dystopian genre. Recommended for 8th and up.

Cranky Japanese girl snubs ancient traditions at her peril. Saki is unhappy to be spending a week with her parents and younger brother in her Grandmother's remote mountain village. Things haven't been the same since her beloved Grandfather passed away and that will be especially evident at the Obon festival for the dead, as he used to tend to the local shrine and cemetery. She also feels pressure to keep up with her mean girl friends back in Tokyo and the spotty cell service is thwarting her. Sent to fetch the traditional new branch for the welcoming fire, Saki sullenly stumbles into the woods, feebly performs the ritual washing at the shrine, and grabs a branch from a rotting tree because it's easiest to reach. The next evening Saki further breaks tradition by going along with some local teens who want to play the Japanese version of Ouija in the cemetery and accidentally trampling the offerings laid out for the dead. The cost of her actions becomes clear that night when a four-tailed fox appears and says Saki must join the night parade of the spirit world to remove the death curse now upon her family. She has three nights to accomplish this and each night brings a unique guide, strange adventures, and opportunities for Saki to decide what kind of person she will become. Reminiscent at times of Spirited Away, Alice in Wonderland, and The NeverEnding Story, this novel skillfully weaves together Japanese traditions and folklore with a very contemporary heroine who must discover what really matters to her. Saki is not particularly likable, but neither was Alice (in my opinion). And unlike Alice, Saki actually learns valuable lessons with the help of both spirits and humans. Readers versed in Japanese tales will recognize much here while unfamiliar readers will enjoy a different type of adventure story. The books seems to function as a stand alone novel, but there are seeds for future potential stories.

Craig Thompson is known in his field for sprawling and complex graphic novels. Here, he leaves the adult content of Blankets and Habibi, and goes back to the narrative territory of his earliest published work, Goodbye, Chunky Rice. Violet is the child of working class parents, struggling to survive in a space-based society. They live in a mobile-home park – in space. Her dad works in logging – of space whale poop. Her mom works in a factory – on an asteroid. One day, a galaxy-level crisis erupts – whale diarrhea is flooding the locations in space where sentient beings live and work. Then, Violet's dad goes missing. Thompson's illustrations are famously detailed - he draws out every item in a trash heap, every thrillseeker in a water park – and this dense style feels almost like a Where's Waldo page in some panels. Parts of this story are familiar – the outer space setting, the plucky female protagonist, the alien sidekicks, the stereotypically attractive adult human characters, the epic quest... And when compared with similar stories – Ben Hatke's Zita the Spacegirl is a prime example – this venture into children's graphic novels does not necessarily break new ground or bring the genre to new heights. However, expectations are inflated for a giant like Thompson, and this is excellent addition to the ranks of high quality graphic novels for kids. Best suited to elementary, middle school, and public libraries.

Having multiple Clairs in the Yard at the same time, upsets the stability of the Yard which results in glitches Clair and her team use to flee from Wallace and other enemies. This story is historical fiction, and similar to The Bluest Eve and also The Color Purple. The author was very ambitious by trying to weave many layers of different stories together, and I admire that ambition, but the end result is awkward. This story seems over-designed, for lack of a better term. There is just too much going on, and on top of that too many switches in the point of view. Naomi is the main character and one that the reader cheers on and roots for throughout the story, and her struggles with enduring sexual abuse, bullying at school, and racism are very moving. The setting of the story is New London Texas in the 1930's when a school above an oil well area blew up, and there were not many survivors. The descriptions of the fall out of all the school kids who were killed or injured is very intense, and not for the faint of heart. Naomi's story combined with this setting is asking a lot of a reader (both emotionally and stylistically), especially near the end. The historical setting and themes about dealing with prejudice can make this worth having in a high school and public library, but add it with caution. Definitely read this before you decide to add it. And if you are on a tight budget it is not a must have.

Then part two begins and there's no Pin, just Pen, 17, (actually Lady Penelope) who lives in the city with her stepmama and two stepsisters. When Pen refuses to marry a much older man, the wickedness comes out of her stepmama and Pen is forced to slave away cleaning by day and sleeping in the cinders by night. Here in the city, the wickedness is dished out by matchmaker Lady Fave (aka the Godmother) who is intent on controlling Pen's destiny, for something called Story. After Pen sees Lady Faye use a thimble to carry out magic acts, she experiments with her own. Meanwhile, Shoe has never forgotten Pin and tries to save her and remind her of their romance. However, Story wants Pen and the prince to have a happily-ever-after and Story has a way of getting what it wants--at any price, even death. Teens who love fairy tales might enjoy this story that has enough romance and action to keep better readers going, however, this confusing Cinderella retelling is over 400 pages and many may not persevere. Even with other fairy tale components mixed in, it's just not enough for me.

It took little time to figure out Mealio is the cafeteria, Cleezies are group meetings, and privo is bathroom, but the foster system was always confusing. Other terms, like CropCamp and SayFree Gov are clearly misnamed to confuse the dystopian society of the book. Kivali is a likeable heroine, an outsider sometimes trusting the wrong people, and disoriented by her strong attraction to another girl. She is brave, and grows due to the help of her new friends. A reference to perhaps catching someone in sexual congress, and an accidental death are the only questionable bits for young kids, but then the language confusion may also confuse them like it did me.

Middle-schooler T-- views the world through the lens of his camera. Despite disfiguring burn marks on his face and neck, T-- always rushes off to take pictures of fires and their aftermath. The real danger in T--'s life is Ryan, Jared and Med, three boys from school who always seem to be around to bully T-- and T--'s best friend Sean. Ryan is the worst villain because parents and teachers only see the smiling popular side that Ryan shows the world-not knowing the heinous acts he does to others. One of T--'s safe places is the school library where the librarian inspires him with real photos by a famous photographer. Throughout this book, the reader can see the supposedly 'real' black and white photographs that T-- has taken which add a gritty layer of realism. After T-- captures Ryan and his gang brutally beating a homeless woman on camera, life becomes even more torturous for T-- as Ryan seeks to prevent him from showing those photos through intimidation and carried out threats that become increasingly violent and deadly. What options does T-- have? Who can help? His fatalistic choices seem unbelievable at times, especially due to his interactions with the librarian where he learns important life lessons through the famous photographs she shares. Ultimately this story is disturbing, bleak and

unsettling. While nothing is graphically described, I'm not sure who to give this to that won't be depressed at the end.

In comes Silas, the good looking new guy in town. Silas has a twin sister Laurel who has severe mental illness believing that she has made up the entire world and that it is all a dream. This leads Silas to break up with Westlin and try and sort out his feelings. This story has many religious references making me think it is geared for religious teens.

Best friends Rosemary and Adam pair up to research a local elderly poet, Constance Brooke, for a school assignment. Their interest in Constance is piqued when Rosemary finds an ancient book hidden in her bedroom that once belonged to Constance. Some of the writing looks like it might have been written by Shakespeare. As Rosemary and Adam read lines from this book, they don't know that the words inside have dark powers that can send someone into the "void and nothing" and accidently cause Adam's older sister Shelby to vanish--even worse no one remembers her existence and it becomes increasingly harder for Rosemary and Adam to remember Shelby. Yet, the smell of the herb rosemary and

Shakespeare's famous lines spoken by Ophelia help trigger their memories that are trying to fade. Hoping Constance can help, they visit her in the nursing home but find out that she has Alzheimer's. Yet when they mention rosemary to her, Constance's memory perks up and she shares clues that might help, but also warns their time is almost up to save Shelby. The book explores tough issues of loss and memory, friendship and family, and how they intertwine and impact those around you. Even though 'Hamlet,' is my favorite Shakespeare play, I tired of the constantly repeating lines about rosemary and remembrance. I'm not sure how many of my middle school students will appreciate this story as it will take a special reader to fall under Rosemary's spell.

Caroline and Trevor meet the first day of 9th grade. She's always been considered a nerd and no boy in middle school would have ever looked twice at her. He's the new kid in town. Both have some pretty serious family issues going on (her: cheating father, him: suicidal mom), but even as they start to get closer they don't really share these parts of their lives. Instead their relationship is fraught with insecurity and fairly quickly also full of sex – with very detailed descriptions. Although this frankness will likely make this book problematic in many school library settings, there is some positive messaging going on. For example, Trevor's mom makes it very clear to him that if he is planning on becoming sexually active with Caroline he needs to be extremely respectful of her, including open, honest discussions about sex and making sure she is comfortable and okay anytime their physical relationship starts to progress. A few other reviews have compared this book to Eleanor and Park, which on the surface maybe accurate, but this book doesn't come close to the

emotional punch of E & P. And, unfortunately the detailed sex scenes will make this hard for many libraries to stock. Grades 10+.

*The Divine* First Second, 2015

After losing out on a promotion, Mark, who now needs money to support a pregnant wife, takes Jason up on an offer to go to Quanlom for a "black ops" operation to blow up a large cave in the heart of the jungle.

Jason is a bigoted, violent man and can only focus on the destruction even when a child is found near the explosion site, injured and crying. Mark rescues the child and after tending to him, takes him "home" to a jungle village run by orphaned kids who say they are cared for by "The Divine" a dragon with magical abilities and the ability to imbue the children with various powers.

Mark is taken captive by the orphans and tortured until he agrees to stop the destruction of what turns out to be the dragon's cave, but fails when Jason blows the cave, apparently nullifying the dragon's power, then captures the now "normal" children. All helicopter away from the scene.

Of course, the dragon attacks, forcing the helicopter to crash. Jason leaves the children, chained to the helicopter to die, but Mark chases after him to get the key to free the children. They fight, Mark kills Jason and frees the children whose powers return. They give Mark a small statue as a gift and we learn that Quanlom's government is cracking down on similar black-ops activities.

Although it has received some acclaim, I found the story disturbing. The dialog was excessively masculinized, with a good degree of bigotry, sexist language and violent descriptions mixed within rather infantile conversations. The artwork was probably the only impressive feature about this graphic novel, yet even that went "over-the-top" with violence, blood and gore. The children in this novel were modeled after much older, haggard soldiers and they behaved more as psychopathic adults than children--which might have been by design to move the storyline, yet really made the entire feel one of disgust and repugnance. I would NOT recommend this book for ages under high school.

Gilded Age gangster lives out the first half of the 20th century as a kind of zombie. Zebulon Finch is sick of his privileged but lonely life with his strict mother in 1890's Chicago. He deserts her to become a street gangster, enjoying the violence while finding comfort in the arms of a prostitute, but his hubris gets him shot by an unknown assailant. Yet after sinking

to the bottom of Lake Michigan, he wakes up to discover himself in the hands of freak show. As he reawakens to his situation and to people, he begins to slowly understand his previous errors. After a violent and dramatic exit from the freak show, he finds refugee with a young doctor who is quickly becoming a mad scientist. At this point, 221 pages in, I got completely grossed out (and I'm not squeamish) and fed up with the writing style, plot, and characters. The entire thing is written in the style of a 19th century novel, which can be accessible for some teen readers, but I'm not convinced anything else about the book would sustain their interest.

Religion: A Discovery in Comics NBM, 2015

Excellent illustrated exploration of major world religions. With honesty and sincerity, comic artist Margreet de Heer uses a cartoon version of herself to walk us through the sources and major tenants of Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism. In the opening chapter, she discusses her roots as the daughter of ministers and a theology student, her own personal religious landscape, and acknowledges the feeling of "walking on eggshells" that come up when discussing religion. In the overview of each religion, she offers a brief history, a core practice or belief, and the "eggs" (i.e. difficult topics) that relate to that religion. In other chapters, she explores the stances of atheists vs fundamentalists, how religions measure up in their views on women, and the scientific study of religion in the brain. de Heer ends by sharing a circular model of searching-finding-embracingquestioning-rejecting that continues for herself as she thinks about religion. She also includes a helpful series of questions that can help a person figure out their beliefs, focusing on the treatment of others, yourself, and the environment. Combining both her personal experiences with facts about various religions and issues has resulted in book both informative and entertaining. Although the author is very respectful and makes an effort to be fair, conservative readers may be uncomfortable with her necessary brevity and image choices for each religion. This is a great introduction for teens (and adults) to consider the religious landscape. I personally made both my kids read it to become better informed.

Breendonk was a Belgian fort taken over by the Nazis during WWII and used as a "reception camp" to house prisoners who were either to be released or transferred to concentration camps. Although less well known than other, larger camps, it was certainly as brutal. Author James Deem tells the stories of individual prisoners, often using personal narratives to describe the terrible treatment, starvation, overwork and torture that prisoners were forced to endure. Photographs of the prisoners as well as sketches by Jacques Ochs (who was imprisoned at Breendonk) of camp conditions and suffering are well chosen accompaniments to the text. By focusing on individual stories of the prisoners, Deem gives the reader a sense of horror and grief that a general overview about concentration camps may not convey. Recommended for high school students.

In this slim yet compact book, the author discusses, in a straightforward, thought-provoking fashion, the various aspects of the Internet privacy debate, including individual rights and ownership of digital data, as well as how to safeguard personal details. Balancing the opinions of legal authorities and technology experts with concrete evidence, the author presents a strong case for greater digital security yet acknowledges the difficulties in doing so. Because laws governing digital privacy issues have not caught up with the constantly changing world of technology, the rights of citizens, the point is made that we are in a legal gray area. Numerous examples, captioned photographs, and informative sidebars support and advance the pro-privacy arguments, while an extensive "Source Notes" section documents the sheer volume of information available on the topic. I believe this is an essential purchase given the amount of data collection that is present in our students' lives.

**Walking Wounded: Uncut stories from Iraq** Nantier, Beall, Minoustchine, 2013 Author Olivier Morel made documentary On the Bridge (2010) This book follows prominent characters from the film but in a more subjective manner.

Broken into sectional chapters, the story moves between present and past discernible by panel colors. Black and white is the "now", sepia tones the past, the mingling of both when the past superimposes itself onto the present.

Morel takes the reader into the world of the young men and women who went to Iraq, most for noble reasons, only to discover that war made them do things to other human beings they could not forgive themselves for. Many committed suicide (between 3 and 22 a day), others take to alcohol, drugs or solitary lives to combat their pain and attempt to forget. But, this is not a story about forgetting. It's a story about seeing something for what it is and facing up to it.

Morel himself begins to experience a version of PTSD as he is immersed in the lives and deaths of these soldiers. By the end of the book, Morel has provided us an unfiltered look at how broken these veterans are, but hope remains. Ryan, who is introduced near the beginning of the book, appears once more as Morel goes into the desert at Ryan's request and then asked to shoot pictures. As Ryan stands on the ledge of a cliff, Morel panics thinking that he's about to capture a suicide on film. But, the veteran only turns and takes off his shirt revealing a tattoo emblazoned across his shoulder and upper back--the only actual photo in the book--two bloody hands, up-turned, horrified, with the caption "Forgive me for I have sinned."

The art is done in black and white and sepia-toned watercolors and ink with significant details that give the book an almost surreal feel about it, as if someone is recalling memories that are uncomfortable and way too vivid. The non-dialog font is that of a journalist or war correspondent from Vietnam, and that with much of the content does push the reader into seeing many similarities between the two. There is no "plot" per se, and at first this can lead to some confusion about where the book is going. However, after realizing that Morel was not really telling a single story, but that of an archetype of veterans who have gone through this experience, it began to solidify. There is nothing straightforward about war, and the horrors soldiers can carry with them about their part in war, and this graphic novels does a remarkable job at demonstrating this in few pages.

Highly recommended for middle through high school, but some caution for younger students.

Dare to Disappoint: Growing Up in Turkey Farrar Straus Giroux, 2015 How much do outsiders know about the country of Turkey? Here, a professor from Northwestern University tells what it was like to grow up in Turkey. She follows her early life, starting in 1981 (before she started school), and ends during college as she looks toward a professional path. Graphic novels are an evocative medium for memoir, and Samanci uses the strengths of visual storytelling to great effect. Her thesis was on using comics in the digital context, and this is clearly a thoughtful work. Her own drawings are cartoonish in a slightly silly way, and she integrates those drawings with elements of collage. There are no panel borders – instead, the images float on white pages. She uses color sparingly -- for instance, to make her blonde head stand out in a crowd scene - and keeps the pages alive with a wide variety of layouts. Her story is a very personal one, in the vein of Marjane Satrapi's Persepolis and Zeina Abirached's A Game for Swallows, but she does take time to reflect on some of the larger issues affecting her world, such as governmental elections and the educational system. This is an important story, and one which will be essential in public libraries, particularly given its relevance to current headlines. In the school context, it may be best suited to high school libraries, due to some of the author's experiences and the scope of this story.

*Messenger: the legend of Joan of Arc, a graphic novel* Candlewick Press, 2014 Follows the typical story of Joan of Arc. Starts at her trial for heresy by Britian's allies. Moves to the past as Jehanne of Domremy, her father a local constable, receives her first of many messages from a divine light which warns her of a village raid by Burgundians, British allies. The raid is thwarted and Jehanne is directed by the voices to prepare the way for the Dauphin to be crowned king of France in Reims and end the British hold on France once and for all.

Jehanne makes many attempts to get her message to the Dauphin, but is thwarted repeatedly by clergy, and mid-level officials along the way. Finally, she is directed to don the armor and appearance of a warrior, complete with claiming the lost sword of St. Catherine of Fierbois. She now declares herself Joan.

She is nearly killed in battle and her survival, along with her talent at strategy, are considered evidence of her divine favor. Her eccentricities (armor, charging into battle, hearing voices) give the French soldiers hope on the battlefield and they begin their march toward Reims where the Dauphin is finally coronated as King Charles VII. Unfortunately, the new king has no stomach for continuing the fight and believes the war can come to an end by treaty. Joan believes this is foolish and continues her push to free Paris from British

control. She fails and is captured by Burgundians still loyal to the British, and tries to escape when she hears they are negotiating to turn her over to the British.

King Charles distances himself from Joan and she is put on trial for heresy in Rouen where an equal number of British and French attend the proceedings. She is found guilty and sentences to burn.

The art work is done with vibrant, yet dark hues. Lines are often thin and rough. At times it appears as if wetness has been spattered on the page, and close-ups show the grit and grime on the characters' faces. This creates an intensity and mood that fits well with the story arc. The writing is not as impressive as the imagery--it just seems contrived in places to me, with Joan never doubting her mission, or the Dauphin's intent. Obviously, it would be difficult to check on the accuracy of the conversations had in this fictionalized account, but they did seem to me, rather adolescent. Which is, perhaps why this book is meant for teens.
